Musings

In the document, “Built of Living Stones” (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops), we read: “Just as the term *Church* refers to the living temple, God’s People, the term *church* also has been used to describe ‘the building in which the Christian community gathers to hear the word of God, to pray together, to receive the Sacraments, and to celebrate the Eucharist.’ That building is both the house of God on earth and a house fit for the saints.

Here are some further directives from the document.

The church is the proper place for the liturgical prayer of the parish community, especially the celebration of the Eucharist on Sunday. It is also the privileged place for adoration of the Blessed Sacrament and reservation of the Eucharist for Communion of the sick. The church is not simply a gathering space but signifies and makes visible the *Church* living in a particular place. As such, the building itself becomes a “sign of the pilgrim Church on earth.” Every church building is a gathering place for the assembly, a resting place, a place of encounter with God, as well as a point of departure on the Church’s unfinished journey toward the reign of God.

Within the church building there is an area designated as the sanctuary and it is in this space where the *altar* and the *ambo* stand and where “the priest, deacon and other ministers exercise their offices. *The principal ritual furnishings within the sanctuary are the altar on which the Eucharistic sacrifice is offered, the ambo from which God’s word is proclaimed, and the chair of the priest celebrant.* These furnishings should be constructed of substantial materials that express dignity and stability. Their placement and design again make it clear that although they are distinct entities, they are related in the one Eucharistic celebration.

At the Eucharist, the liturgical assembly celebrates the ritual sacrificial meal that recalls and makes present Christ’s life, death, and resurrection, proclaiming “the death of the Lord until he comes.” The *altar* is “the center of thanksgiving that the Eucharist accomplishes” and the point around which the other rites are in some manner arrayed. Since the Church teaches that “the altar is Christ,” its composition should reflect the nobility, beauty, strength and simplicity of the One it represents. In new churches there is to be *only one altar* so that it “signifies to the assembly of the faithful the one Christ and the one Eucharist of the Church.” While the altar is the natural focal point of the sanctuary, the central focus of the area in which the Word of God is proclaimed during the liturgy is the *ambo*. The prominent placement of the ambo reflects the dignity and nobility of

that saving word and draws the attention of those present to the proclamation of the word. The design of the altar and ambo should bear a harmonious and close relationship to one another in order to emphasize the close relationship between word and Eucharist.

The chair of the priest celebrant stands as a symbol of his office of presiding over the assembly and directing prayer. The chair reflects the dignity of the one who leads the community in the person of Christ, but is never intended to be remote or grandiose. The priest celebrant chair is distinguished from the seating of other ministers by its design and placement. The most appropriate place for the chair is at the head of the sanctuary and turned toward the people. (Next week the Baptistry and the reservation of the Eucharist)

4º Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

"Grita profeta que el amor de Dios es uno", resonaba este canto en un encuentro de jóvenes al que tuve la oportunidad de asistir hace ya tiempo. La impresión que me dio al ver a tantos jóvenes cantando a una voz es que ellos tenían la seguridad de sentirse amados y tomados en cuenta para que Dios realizara sus planes en ellos: ¡ser profetas! Las lecturas de hoy declaran la diversidad de la Escritura. El profeta Jeremías y Lucas expresan el motivo y la fuerza de cómo Dios llama a los profetas, y de cómo a la vez son rechazados por las personas a las que son enviados. Cada lectura nos da muestras de violencia y de cómo Dios protege y auxilia al profeta. ¿Hemos experimentado alguna vez rechazo a causa de ser profeta? ¿De qué forma Dios nos saca del apuro?

Se dice constantemente que no tenemos vocaciones, especialmente aquí en la iglesia de Estados Unidos. Y es verdad: yo he notado que existe mucho miedo dentro de las familias hispanas de encausar a sus hijos e hijas a la vocación sacerdotal y religiosa. ¿Por qué será? ¿Cuál es el miedo? Quizá sea porque no nos abrimos a la invitación del Espíritu de Dios a seguirlo aunque la tarea no sea fácil. El Papa Juan Pablo II nos decía cuando fue a la Habana Cuba en 1998: "No tengan miedo de abrir sus corazones a Cristo [?] para que así todo sea renovado". Recordemos siempre que no estamos solos en nuestra búsqueda; Dios es fiel en el camino. Y aunque a veces pongamos oídos sordos, no escaparemos a algún día ser profetas. Hagamos oración durante la semana con el himno a la caridad de San Pablo (1 Cor 13, 1-13). Démosle todo el corazón al Señor, no sólo partes del mismo. Seamos profetas enteros.
